30M EXCLUSION ZONE AROUND WRECK OF THE SOUTH AUSTRALIAN

It was announced in The Advertiser on 5th July that the site of the 1837 wreck of the *South Australian* at Victor Harbor has been established and will now have a 30m exclusion zone around it for protection. Five prohibited activities were listed, plus details of liability for criminal prosecution and \$1,000 fine. Details can be found at

Meanwhile, some of the Thai volunteers were involved in another rescue when they saved a baby boy after a dam collapsed in southern Laos. The baby boy had to be carried through swirling floods and waist-high mud by the rescuers.

Congratulations also go to any SA divers in their 70s and 80s who are still able to dive regularly. It was recently revealed on air that Adelaide Scuba's John Bent is still diving at the age of 78, something that many of us can only aspire to. And if 78 sounds impressive, what about Cave Diver #1, Dave Warnes still diving in Tank Cave for 85 minutes at the age of 82?

CEMETERY REEFS

According to the web page found at <u>http://www.abc.net.au/news/2018-07-18/underwater-cemetery-idea-floated-council-gold-coast-qld/10006824</u>, an underwater cemetery and dive site on the Gold Coast has been proposed. The council is considering building a site for burial urns in the city's Broadwater. Based on the Neptune Memorial Reef in Florida in the United States, it is hoped that the cemetery would attract diving tourism. The Gold Coast Mayor suggested that people's ashes could be mixed with environmentally-friendly materials to create a dive precinct. He said the precinct could be positioned about 2 nautical miles off the spit, near a proposed underwater dive pyramid.

NEW GREAT BARRIER REEF POSTAGE STAMPS

A series of 5 postage stamps depicting marine creatures from the Great Barrier Reef are being released by Australia Post on 1st August. The "Reef Safari" set features 4 X \$1 stamps and 1 X \$2 stamp. They feature a nautilus, a green sea turtle, an olive sea snake, an emperor angelfish and a grey reef shark (\$2). NEW NORFOLK ISLAND STAMPS

Also featured in the July-August 2018 issue of "Stamp Bulletin" were two Norfolk Island stamps depicting the island's Crystal Pool at Point Ross (on the south-western end of Norfolk Island). The tidal pool was formed from volcano lava beds and eroded lava tunnels. It is a popular location for swimming and snorkelling. Access to the pool, however, is difficult. Ropes have to be used for part of the journey down some cliffs.

'SEAHORSE HOTELS' BEING TRIALLED IN N.S.W.

Wild storms at Port Stephens on the NSW coast from 2010-13 destroyed habitat and also almost destroyed one of the largest concentrations of seahorses in the world. The seahorse population declined by 90% in just a three-year period. Artificial habitats called them seahorse hotels are yielding positive results. Three different seahorse hotel designs are being trialled and they are proving an early success. Further details are given below: - 'SEAHORSE HOTELS' BRING AN ENDANGERED SPECIES BACK FROM THE EDGE OF EXTINCTION

One of the largest concentrations of seahorses in the world was once found at Port Stephens on the New South Wales coast, until wild storm seasons from 2010 to 2013 destroyed habitat and almost destroyed the population. "If you wanted to see seahorses, you'd come to Port Stephens. You'd hop in here and you'd see 30 to 40 seahorses on every single dive, it was fantastic," said Dr David Harasti from NSW Fisheries. "But in just a three-year period the population declined by 90 per cent. One site where I used to get 400 animals, I saw 10 there. On another site the population of 200 went down to about 20. "The decline was quite dramatic and because of that decline the species became the second endangered seahorse listed in the world." Dr Harasti said several large East Coast Low storms shifted large volumes of sand in the port which smothered the seahorse habitat of soft corals and sponges. A number of poorly located moorings and anchor damage from boats also contributed to the habitat destruction and left behind vast tracts of barren sand. Fortunately, Dr Harasti was struck with inspiration. "I used to see old discarded crab traps underwater covered in sponges and algae and just by chance I'd see seahorses living on them," he said. "So we decided to introduce our own artificial habitats and I've called them seahorse hotels. "I've always got this whole concept underwater — if you build it they will come — so we've built the infrastructure for the seahorses, the hotels are there and now the seahorses are colonizing them." It is still early days, but after just six months underwater, the seahorse hotels are yielding positive results. "Where we used to have no seahorses. We've had around 20 or so animals living on the seahorse hotels," he said. "Each time we survey a hotel there are adults

on there, there are juveniles and we're finding they're very territorial, so we tag the seahorses and we find the same animals from three or four months ago still living on them which is great." Seahorses rely on their habitat to camouflage themselves from predators, as a holdfast to prevent being washed away and as a source of food, predating on the micro-crustaceans that live on the habitats. The success of the seahorse hotels is being closely monitored by Michael Simpson, who is conducting his PhD on the experiment with Sydney University. Three different seahorse hotel designs are being trialled for their effectiveness, and so far all the hotels are proving an early success. "It was a bit of a surprise how quickly seahorses appeared on there," Mr Simpson said. "It's a good thing in the sense that you may not need additional complexity in a seahorse hotel to promote seahorse numbers. "It may be as simple as putting a cage out." The goal of his research is to design a cheap and easy model for building seahorse hotels that could be used in sites all over the world where populations are declining. Mr Simpson is also trialling the effectiveness of swimming nets as an artificial habitat in Sydney Harbour, another population centre of White Seahorses that is on the decline." MARC SLUSZNY

According to the web page found at <u>https://www.vrt.be/vrtnws/en/2018/06/30/belgian-adventurer-marc-sluszny-gone-missing/</u>, Belgium's Marc Sluszny went missing after a diving accident in southern France. Rescue workers have stopped the search; maybe a specialised team will start a new search at a later stage. Sluszny visited an underground cave with a friend in Salses-le-Chateau, in southern France..... When the two were at a depth of 125 metres, things went wrong. Sluszny lost contact with his fellow diver when the cable between the two men snapped. His companion managed to return, but Sluszny went missing. A long search proved fruitless." It was later reported that one of the cave divers attempting to recover Marc's body died in the process. The recovery diver apparently died in the staging area (30-40m?).

CLOSED SEASON FOR ROCK LOBSTER

The annual SA closure for Rock Lobster fishing will remain in place in the Southern Zone until 6 am on 1st October and in the Northern Zone until midday on 1st November. All Rock Lobster taken by recreational fishers must have the middle tail fan clipped in half to a recognisable straight line before landing. Visit
