OUR LEAD STORY: CUTTLEFISH ALLIANCE LAUNCHED

In June, the Scuba Divers Federation of South Australia launched the Cuttlefish Alliance in an effort to bring together organisations and individuals concerned about the lifting of the temporary fishing restrictions on the Giant Cuttlefish.

We are pleased to announce that we now have an independent Advisory Committee that will prepare a position statement with recommendations to take to the Department of Primary Industries and Regions South Australia (PIRSA), based on science and the value of the Giant Cuttlefish migration to the tourism economy of Whyalla and South Australia.

The SDFSA notes that we need to recognise the reality of multiple stakeholders and users of the marine environment. But as our President, Andrew Hunter, noted in his letter to the editor of the Adelaide Sunday Mail, the substantial (and growing) economic benefit to the Whyalla region from this world-renowned event must also be considered. Numbers matter: hundreds of thousands of migrating cuttlefish attract tens of thousands of dollars from tourism. Reduce the impact of the spectacle and you reduce the level of tourism.

The Cuttlefish Alliance Advisory Committee will help us find a pathway to a good solution, which we will take to the Cuttlefish reference group that advises PIRSA, and to the Minister himself.

The Committee consists of:

- Carl Charter (or alternate), Experiencing Marine Sanctuaries
- Dr. Zoe Doubleday, cephalopod expert, University of South Australia
- Tony Bramley, Whyalla Diving Services
- Andrew Hunter, President, SDFSA.

Whyalla Council is supporting the Committee with the provision of tourism and other economic data that may be useful. Additional scientific experts will also be consulted as we proceed.

A Facebook page has been set up to gather and share information, petitions, and campaigns to encourage PIRSA to reconsider restrictions on fishing for Giant Cuttlefish, especially during the period of the aggregation and reproduction. So far we have reached over 16,000 people through Facebook. Concerns generally about the cuttlefish have led to stories on radio, TV and newspapers, including an interview with Andrew Hunter on CoastFM.

Two petitions are currently underway: an electronic petition that will be sent to the Minister responsible for PIRSA, MP Tim Whetstone, and a formal petition (with original signatures) to be tabled in the SA Parliament by MP Eddie Hughes. We ask everyone to consider supporting both petitions. The electronic petition (with over 5600 signatures at the time of writing) is at <https://www.change.org/p/minister-tim-whetstone-protect-whyalla-s-giant-cuttlefish-aggregation>.

A copy of the formal petition can be found in most dive shops in South Australia, and efforts will be made to expand access to the formal petition interstate.

STEVE'S SCIENCE STORY for the month

The number of Nectria seastar species has now been reduced by one.

There were previously six species of the seastar but one of them has now been eliminated. According to the web page found at <https://reeflifesurvey.com/breaking-nectria-cases-decrease/>, confusion over the identification of two similar sea stars has now been resolved courtesy of Reef Life Survey (RLS) volunteer Andrew Green.

Scientists are now listing five species of Nectria seastars as follows: -

Nectria ocellata, *N. macrobrachia*, *N. saoria*, *N. wilsoni* and *N. pedicelligera*. The multi-spined sea star, *Nectria multispina* has been eliminated from the list.

Scientists previously had difficulty distinguishing *N. multispina* from *N. pedicelligera*. When Graham Edgar was revising the section on Nectria for his updating of "Australian Marine Life" to a 3rd edition, his contact advised:

"*Nectria pedicelligera* is collected more frequently than *N. multispina*.... The two species don't show any clear difference based on the data I have access to (e.g. no clear demarcation by depth etc.), but there's still a lot we don't know about these species. The distinguishing characters might easily be some kind of phenotypic variability related to predators, wave activity or something else."

Green notes that "Edgar went with *N. pedicelligera*... and so has RLS. Meaning that if you submit survey records of *N. multispina*, the RLS system will 'port' the data to *N. pedicelligera*. But he also cautions that "Some well-respected authorities (including the World Registry of Marine Species -- WoRMS) currently recognise both species. (But) New evidence could still arise confirming that *N. multispina* does in fact exist alongside *N. pedicelligera*!"

Nectria macrobrachia - Large-plated Sea Star

Nectria ocellata - Spotted Sea Star

Nectria saoria - Saori's Sea Star

Nectria pedicelligera – (no common name)

Nectria multispina – (no common name) – Possibly should actually be *Nectria pedicelligera*

Nectria wilsoni – (no common name)

N. macrobranchia - Large-armed sea star
N. saoria - Saori sea star
