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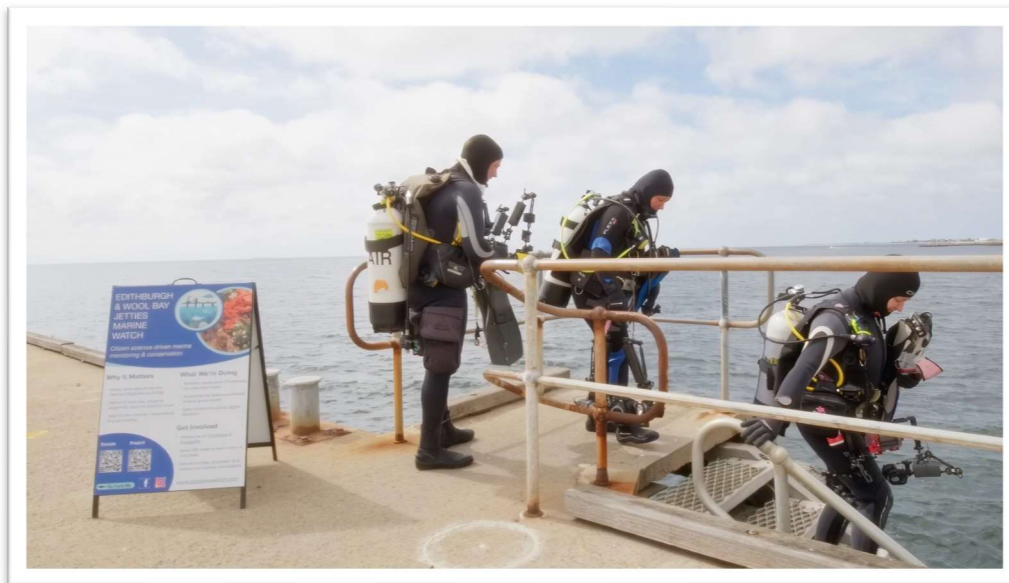

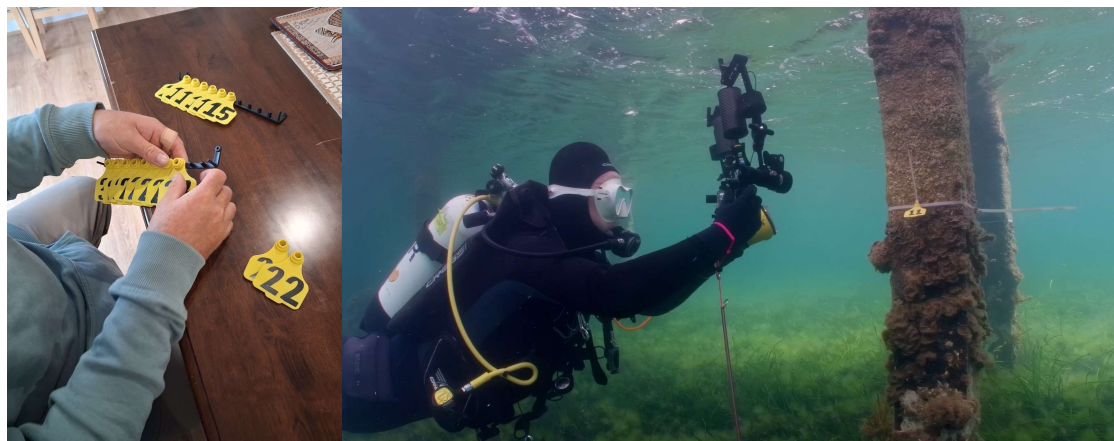
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WANT TO HELP WITH THE ALGAL BLOOM RESPONSE?

JOIN THE CITIZEN SCIENCE PROJECT AT EDITHBURGH AND WOOL BAY

Paul Macdonald and Elizabeth Solich are looking for more volunteers to participate in the successful Edithburgh and Wool Bay Jetties Marine Watch project. This underwater monitoring program has already attracted 14 passionate volunteers, including experienced divers, photographers, and local community members, with one participant travelling from interstate to take part. With monthly monitoring weekends now underway, additional volunteers are sought to strengthen the program and expand its impact.



Designed by divers, for divers, the initiative provides a structured yet rewarding way to contribute directly to marine conservation and post-disturbance recovery. The project is guided by marine scientists and supported by the District Council of Yorke Peninsula, ensuring that volunteer-collected data aligns with recognised scientific monitoring methods and contributes to broader conservation objectives.

The program was initially launched through strong community support, raising over \$5,000 via a GoFundMe campaign. Building on this momentum, the Wool Bay component of the project has more recently been awarded a \$10,000 Coastal Protection Board Community Participation Grant, enabling the continuation and expansion of monitoring activities. Project funding will be used to support costs associated with monitoring equipment purchases, public engagement materials, digital content production, data management, volunteer out of pocket expenses, training, and other incidentals.

Monitoring weekends begin with a Friday night briefing covering photographic monitoring techniques, site conditions, and safety protocols. Over the weekend, volunteers complete two monitoring dives at Edithburgh and two at Wool Bay, collecting observations that contribute to a long-term understanding of ecosystem health, recovery, and change.

On Saturday evening, volunteers come together for a relaxed barbecue, providing time to connect, exchange knowledge, and share insights and observations from the dives. These informal discussions support consistent data collection while creating valuable opportunities for learning and mentoring across experience levels.



To reduce barriers to participation, accommodation and breakfast are provided at Edithburgh Diving throughout the monitoring weekend. Partial reimbursements are also available to assist with petrol and air fill costs.



The program is currently seeking volunteer underwater photographers, support divers, and concierges (to assist with on-shore coordination and public engagement).

Scientific diving experience is welcomed but not required. Participants receive coaching and guidance in underwater photography techniques used for monitoring, making the program accessible to qualified divers and underwater photographers keen to contribute to

conservation focused outcomes. Volunteers are required to provide their own dive and camera equipment; suitable cameras include TG Series models, smartphones, mirrorless, and DSLRs. Video lights are required for participation and can be supplied for volunteers who do not have their own.

“This is a chance for divers to turn their passion into action,” said Elizabeth Solich. “By combining local knowledge, volunteer effort, and scientific guidance, we can create a meaningful record of change and help support future restoration.”

Divers and conservation-minded volunteers are encouraged to step up and get involved for one or more monitoring weekends. SUMMER PHOTO COMPETITION OPEN!

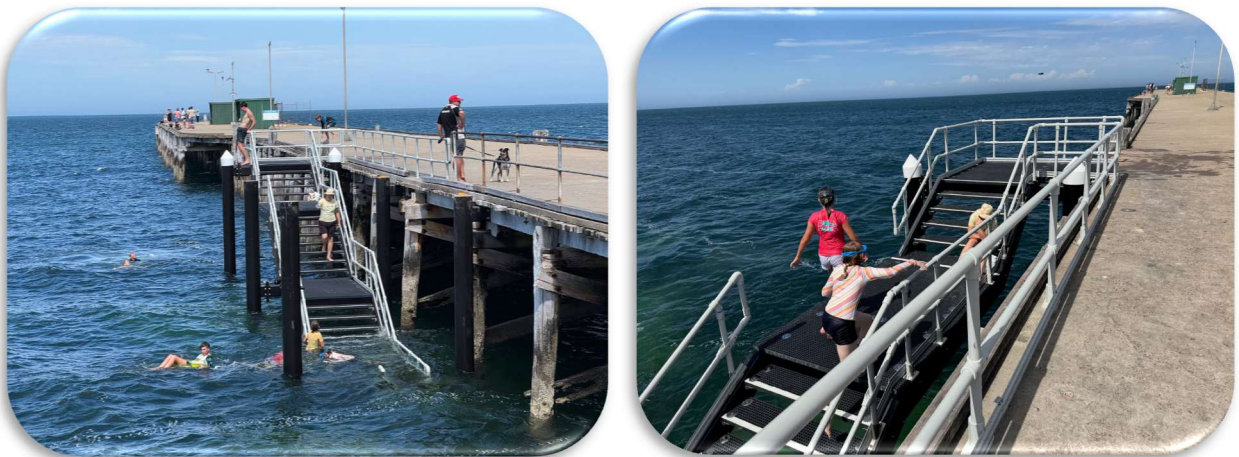

EDITHBURGH JETTY STEPS IN PLACE

The new diving steps at Edithburgh jetty opened just in time for Christmas Day last month. Former SDFS Committee Member Steve Simmons reports that “plenty of tourists are making the most of the new steps, certainly a big hit with the kids, the new stairs are very popular and definitely fit for purpose. The new stairs certainly help access and egress to the water and make it easier for those who want to dive here and support our beautiful village.”



As far as marine life conditions at Edithburgh go, Simmo notes that there are “some signs of small creatures migrating back but the pylons are still quite bare and it is a far cry from what it was before the bloom, interestingly if you move away from the jetty there is more life; for some reason the jetty got hit harder than the surrounding area. The contributing factors may have been water run off from heavy rain on 4th of April 2025 pushing lots of nutrients into the water around the shore end of the jetty and less tidal flow than the surrounding area. Whatever the contributing factors, it’s great to see some life returning.”

PICCANINNIE PONDS CLOSED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

EWENS PONDS OPEN: Entry into Ewens Ponds for snorkelling and scuba is now permitted once more. Snorkelling permits will be open for booking until 31st January 2026. National Parks SA will “continue to monitor water levels with further dates to be released being dependent upon conditions being experienced... Diving is permitted when participating as part of a guided and accredited tour ONLY. Free Diving, body boards, blow-up floatation devices, or any form of boating are NOT permitted. <https://www.parks.sa.gov.au/parks/ewens-ponds-conservation-park/booking/91777>.

STATUS OF EWENS PONDS

One of our regular contributors to SA Dive Sites Viz & Conditions Facebook group has posted the following: “Meadows of greenery now barren, significantly thinned out plant life, blue green algae coating healthy plants, filamentous algae covering everything like The Blob due to the lower flow of water, temperatures up to 19 degrees C (likely due to the slow flow of water), and visibility dramatically dropped. Bookings are open but limited, with rangers on site to make sure only those with bookings get in. Remember how accidentally touching the silty bottom would lead to a shameful cloud? No longer the case -- the filamentous algae is thick enough across the bottom of all ponds that almost nothing gets stirred up. It probably looks pretty to people unfamiliar with the site... but it's utterly devastating.”
